I've never heard anyone or anything quite like him, before or since. On his recordings, in his live shows (one of which it was my privilege to see) Bill Hicks told truths and asked questions and gave answers in a way that left me both grateful and stunned. Grateful, because - as Jesse says in this issue - I was glad *someone* was there to raise and comment on these issues; stunned, because he managed to do so while damn near making me laugh my guts out.

I can't possibly do the man justice in a few paragraphs - in fact, I couldn't do Bill and his career justice if I wrote from now 'til doomsday. Instead, let me recommend you check out his work on tape or CD. Currently available from Rykodisc are *Dangerous, Relentless, Arizona Bay* and my personal favourite, *Rant in E-Minor*. Try 'em, folks. I very much doubt you'll regret it.
